## GUILLEN BILL EXPANDS PUBLIC SERVICE OPTIONS

HB 3055 Updates Outdated Government Code

**AUSTIN** – Texas State Representative Ryan Guillen's (D-Rural South Texas) bill, HB 3055, will allow county election administrators to run for a non-partisan office in a separate county, increasing their ability to serve the public. HB 3055 was referred to the Texas Senate State Affairs committee on **Monday**, **May 8**.

"Texas should promote, not penalize, the outstanding civic servants in our communities," said Guillen. "If qualified non-partisan officials want to help out another county as an election administrator, we should not let bureaucracy get in the way."

Under current law, a county elections administrator cannot hold a nonpartisan office while simultaneously acting as a county elections administrator. Specifically, a county elections administrator is barred from being considered a candidate for public office, hold public office or hold an office or a position for a political party. If an individual accepts any of the aforementioned positions, or is found to be currently holding such a position, then they are required to resign as county elections administrator. Additionally, county elections administrators are forbidden from making any political contributions, or from publicly supporting or opposing a candidate running for public office.

The outdated law has caused unnecessary resignations of qualified county elections administrators, further diminishing voting practices in Texas. HB 3055 would add a provision which would enable county elections administrators to hold nonpartisan office in a county other than that which they are an elections administrator.

"I can see no conflict of interest for a non-partisan elected official in one county to act as a county elections administrator in another county," said Guillen. "Our communities deserve to have the most qualified county elections administrators Texas can provide, and HB 3055 will help ensure that."

Representative Ryan Guillen serves ten rural South Texas counties in the Texas House of Representatives, including Atascosa, Brooks, Duval, Jim Hogg, Kenedy, La Salle, Live Oak, McMullen, Starr, and Willacy.
